HOW HOT IS YOUR CAR? DON'T PUT YOUR PETS IN DANGER!

- On a comfortable 70 degree day, your car's temperature can actually rise to 104 degrees within 30 minutes.
- Shade and cracked windows WILL NOT keep the care at a comfortable temperature.
- Heat stroke can happen quickly in all animals, but animals who are elderly, overweight, have short muzzles, and those with thick or dark colored coats are more at risk.
- If your dog becomes overheated, seek veterinary treatment immediately, turn the A/C on and place cool towels over the animal. Never immerse the animal in cold water.

LEAVE YOUR PETS AT HOME!

It is against the law to leave a pet unattended in a parked vehicle in a manner theat endangers the health or safety of the animal. An animal cruelty conviction could result in a jail sentence and/or a fine.





17th Teen Academy Offers Fun and Experience

This year's annual Teen Academy, which met from July 11-15, provided exciting, hands-on ways for teens to learn about the various aspects of law enforcement. The 18 participants were introduced to Uniform Operations, the K-9 Unit, and Forensics on their first day. They spent most of the second day on the challenge course before visiting the County Animal Shelter. On day three, the teens learned about the traffic team, and the use of radar to check auto speed. Details of the operation and importance of Crime Solvers and a tour of Enon were also provided. Day four was multi-faceted; the first half was spent at the Chesterfield County airport, and the second half of the day was spent learning about internet safety, detective work, and police service aids. On the final day, the teens learned about our SWAT (Special Weapons and Tactics) Team, drug-use prevention, and opioids. A graduation ceremony completed the Academy on Friday.

Learning the broad spectrum of police work surely impressed these young people, all of whom left the program with a deeper understanding and appreciation for their county police department.















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
